# From the Rectory

# Choices, choices, choices

I've been thinking how sad it is that the word 'Discrimination' carries such negative overtones these days. There was a time when to call someone discriminating was to pay them a great compliment, because, simply put, it meant that they were the kind of person who knew how to make good choices.

I find this especially ironic given that choice and the freedom to choose are so highly prized just now. To be able to choose is, for many of us, one of the ways we demonstrate that we have arrived. It means we have a certain control and autonomy. For instance, to have that operation at a time and place of 'my choosing' is what many of the upwardly-mobile aspire to.

But here's the thing, the choices we make tell a story. The things we choose give away something about who we think we are, the values we hold, and what we really believe life is about.

What's more, our choices have consequences for others. For example, the vast array of goods that I expect to see in the supermarket is a consequence of business pandering to my desire for choice, often with consequences for much poorer countries than our own. In the great debate about abortion, what is called a woman's 'right to choose' has consequences for almost 200,000 unborn children each year in this country alone. My choice to drink or eat to excess, my lifestyle choices, have consequences for the health service and for those who love me.

The tragedy is that some people I meet give the impression of being frightened of making choices because they have been brought up on the illusion of `continuing choice`, especially in marriage and relationships. That is, imagining that they might one day get a `better offer`, they prefer to keep their options open.

Others have bought into the idea that they don't have to choose. That is, it's sometimes suggested that we can have it all and we can do it all. But, of course, the result of this is burn out, with many people, especially our children, living lives crammed with activities, exhausted and without time to reflect.

These are not easy matters and our hearts go out to those who wrestle with painful choices just now. My point is that, whilst we live in a culture which seems to prize the `right to choose`, we seem uncertain about how - how to be truly `discriminating`.

For the Christian, when it comes to making choices, the heart of the Good News is the Jesus who says, "You did not choose me, I chose you". It is this truth, that we have been created and loved into being by God, which truly defines us. It's this truth which is the springing point for all our choosing. We might say, "Because I am a beloved son or daughter of God, therefore..."

What I mean is that, in all our choosing, the Christian is beholden to Jesus and his will for us rather than our own wisdom, desires or convenience. St Paul tells us, "You are not your own. You were bought with a price" and "We make it our aim to please him".

A Christian called St Ignatius put it like this. He said, "I want and I choose what better leads to the deepening of God's life in me". Ignatius saw himself as made, loved and called by God. So, he set his heart on living a life that would be a big 'thank you' to God. This is what guided his choices. "I am a Christian, therefore...". So, how will you go about making your choices today? What and who will guide you?



### NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE



A special service will be held at Carlisle Cathedral on Saturday, 21st September at 2 pm to mark the 30th anniversary of the first ordination of women Priests. The Rev'd Canon Angela Whittaker, Bishop's Adviser for Women's Ministry in the Diocese of Carlisle, will preside at a Eucharist in Celebration of 30 Years of Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. She will be supported on the day by the Rev'd Ruth Newton, who joins the Diocese as the new Archdeacon of Carlisle from the 1st September, and who will preach at the service.

At Bristol Cathedral on 12 March 1994, Barry Rogerson, the Bishop of Bristol, ordained 32 women to the priesthood, who become the first in the Church of England.

Final legislation for women to become priests was approved by General Synod on 11th November 1992, before a pastoral statement in 1993 by the House of Bishops (known as the 'Manchester Statement') paved the way for approval in both Parliamentary Houses. The measure received Royal Assent on 5th November 1993.

All are welcome to attend this special service. Tickets are free but must be reserved in advance. After the service refreshments will be served in the Cathedral. #### VICAR'S DAVE DAY TRIBUTE



# **Ruth's Story**

Dear Father God: Look with mercy on those who flee from danger, homeless and hungry.

Bless those who work to bring them relief, and inspire generosity and compassion in all our hearts.

Hear us, Good Lord.<sup>1</sup>

This is the story of migration, which begins "Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God, my God". Hospitality is the approach in this story, not hostility. It is in the third history book in the Old Testament, after the Pentateuch. Joshua succeeds Moses, and his book includes the crossing of the Red Sea; in Judges we learn of the power of God given to Samson; but Ruth relates some important genealogy.

In a nutshell, the story begins with famine in the land, so Elimelech decides to leave Bethlehem, travelling to the east side of the Dead Sea. Ruth is the second daughter of Elimelech and his wife Naomi. Both daughters marry. First Ruth's father dies, then the sons-in-law of Naomi, who now decides to return to Bethlehem; but Orpah, the eldest, won't go.

The climax of the story is then, when Naomi insists that Ruth stay, also in Moab with her sister, but Ruth says the oft-quoted words, "Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God, my God". And this is what motivates asylum-seekers all of the world today, wanting to stay with a member of the family, despite the odds of losing their lives in danger on the journey.

The barley harvest was just beginning when Ruth with her mother-in-law arrive in Bethlehem. A stranger is kind to Ruth and says, "I know how you left...your own country and how you came to live among a people you had never known before".<sup>3</sup> Elimelech's field is sold and the widow Ruth becomes Boaz' wife. She bears a son Obed, the father of Jesse, father to King David. These three are part of the 14 generations from Abraham: before 14 to the exile in Babylon, and 14 to the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem.<sup>4</sup> So you see how important is Ruth's commitment to follow the Lord's will, by sticking with her mother-in-law Naomi.

The Old Testament includes some behaviour quite strange to us, stories that make a good read. I recommend Joshua, Judges and Ruth to start, for your early morning Bible Study. Take the time and enjoy them – one day we may meet Ruth in Heaven!

# Five Misconceptions that Hinder Prayer

We yearn for prayer and hide from prayer. We believe we should do it - we even want to do it - but something stands between us and actually praying. What keeps us from enjoying prayer as a love relationship with God?

# Misconception 1: Prayer means talking.

This is perhaps the most basic misconception people have about prayer - that it means telling God what we want. Prayer, in fact, is interaction. You can find illustrations throughout the Bible, from Adam and Eve through the Book of Revelation, of the kind of interchange that goes on in prayer. Fénelon wrote about the need to silence and still all creaturely activity so that we can hear the Divine whisper. Prayer is being able to respond to the voice of God, primarily through the Bible, yes. Yet God speaks in many ways. Prayer is mainly listening. It is the interaction, the dialogue, the interchange between two individuals. It's talking with God and hearing from God about what God and I are doing together.

## Misconception 2: Prayer cannot be learned.

Some people think that prayer is a gift - you either have it or you don't. Look at the Christian colleges in our country and see how many of them have courses in prayer. This is because we don't believe prayer is something to learn. We also show that we think prayer cannot be learned when we're not willing to risk making mistakes. Yet that's the way you learn anything. That's the way little children learn how to walk - they fall down. That's the way Edison learned how to make the first lightbulb - through the many thousands of experiments that didn't work. Prayer is something to learn, "Lord, teach us to pray".

# Misconception 3: Prayer is complicated.

In one sense, prayer is complicated. How can a finite human spirit be in communion with the infinite Spirit of the universe? It would burn out the circuits of our minds to understand it. But in another sense, prayer is incredibly simple. God answers prayer because His children ask. Just as a little child cannot draw a bad picture, a child of God cannot utter a bad prayer. God is pleased with our desire to come to Him. The accuser might say, "That's a terrible prayer. The grammar is bad; it's egocentric. It's wrongheaded". But I think God says, "That's My child. He's chosen to come and be with Me. She's chosen to be in My presence. It's a beautiful prayer". God receives it. It's not complicated.

## Misconception 4: Prayer is grim duty.

Prayer can be hard work. But I also think that people need to see prayer as a delight, as joyful interaction with a loving God.

I remember one time when I was vacationing near a beach in Oregon. I got up early and went out on the beach just as it was beginning to get light. I remember, saying really loud, "This is beautiful". And I sensed a response, as if God were saying, "I know; I made it". I thought, Whoa! And then I said, "Thank You, Lord". I sensed God saying, "You're welcome"! And I thought again, Whoa! God was there!

This unusually strong sense of a dialogue lasted about an hour and a half. I decided to ask God some questions I'd always had. I was very intense in those days, and I was really worried about what I wore as a sign of witness to gospel truth. I wondered whether a white-shirt-and-tie mentality contradicted the concept of Christian simplicity. So, I asked God what I should wear. And it was like God laughed and said, "Oh, quit trying to be so blasted religious and wear whatever you want"! That gave me great freedom.

We have a heritage that labels a person as deeply spiritual if he says, "For the first hour I struggled and the second hour nothing happened, but the third hour I broke through to God". We read books on prayer and get loaded down with guilt, thinking something is wrong with us if we don't agonize over prayer.

We need to recognize that there is also the need for lightness in prayer. It's an occupational hazard of religious people to get too serious.

## Misconception 5: God is remote and inaccessible.

On a practical level, many people are deists. That is, to them, God is far away. Yet, the gospel teaches very clearly that God is near. When Jesus said, "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand", it was not a way of saying, "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven has almost come, but it didn't quite make it". Instead, His meaning was the same as if I were to say to you as we're walking down the street, "Behold, the restaurant is at hand. Let's eat". That's the idea. "It's drawn near to you; it's come nigh", He said. "It's even in your midst. It's right here."

God is near; the Kingdom of the heavenlies has come. Jesus' miracles demonstrated the presence of the Kingdom; the nearness of God. God is no longer remote; God is right among His people. What does Immanuel mean? God is with us. He is still present. And we can rejoice in the presence of God.

#### SHORT WALKS

Finally we walked down through the woods at the Cumbria Grand Hotel and made our way to the



Hazelmere café for a coffee and more chat.

When you meet new people at church one of the questions always asked is 'How long have you lived in Grange?' Always a good starter for a conversation, and I cannot believe we have lived here for 32 years!

Originally born a true Barrovian in 1963, I grew up in Barrow, attending St Paul's Church, where my mother was a PCC member, amongst other organisations. I attended St Paul's Junior School, Barrow Grammar School, followed by the new 6th Form College and then Northumbria University then known as Newcastle upon Tyne Polytechnic) to study Business Studies, a thin sandwich course. This meant I had to spend 12 months in industry and my first placement was in 'Strategic Planning' at Vickers Shipbuilding where my father had worked all in his life as an engineer.

On my first day, I met Eric my future husband in the canteen queue, and the rest is history as they say. We were married in 1987 and lived in Ulverston for 5 years. Eric was a Naval Architect and I worked as a Training Officer in VSEL. # Calling our 'Crafty' folk!

Unfortunately our regular monthly craft sessions have come to an end because Pip has recently changed jobs and is working to a different shift pattern. However, for those idle hands and those who love knitting here is an invitation for you to support 'Teddies for tragedies' - and specifically for Ukrainian children in hospital.

#### TEDDY KNITTING INSTRUCTIONS

Double knitting wool. Size 10 needles. Wool is available at the library and also at the Age Concern shop in the station yard.

4 colours – head and paws (bear colour), Trousers/Jumper/Scarf.

Cast on 10 stitches for paws. Knit 10 rows.

Change to trouser colour and knit 30 rows.

Make another leg in the same way.

Knit across all 20 stitches and work 16 rows

Change to jumper colour and knit 24 rows

Change to bear colour and change to stocking stitch for head. \* Work 5½ inches and change to jumper colour. \* Continue remainder of Teddy in reverse order. Stitch down the sides of the head. With jumper colour pick up 8 stitches either side of the neck join (16 stitches in all) and knit 20 rows. Change to bear colour and knit 10 rows for paws.

Sew up Teddy leaving opening in crotch. Sew diagonal corners for ears <u>before</u> stuffing. Stuff with polyester or other healthy padding. Foam rubber is not recommended as babies may chew it.

Then run a thread through the knitting around the neck to draw it in. Sew <u>happy</u> face on Teddy. For mouth use stem or back stitch.

#### Scarf.

Cast on 75 stitches and knit 4 rows and cast off. Tie scarf on Teddy and sew firmly to back of neck but do not sew down at front.

Teddies also require little bags made from material with a drawstring in the top. Finished size should be 10" x 13" roughly. Please do not use elastic as drawstring.

Here are some of the teddies that Margaret Caseley has already made. Have a word with her if you are interested.



Some interesting facts about trees to think about perhaps when you are walking in the woods round Grange.

The **wood wide web** is a concept that compares the underground network of fungi connecting trees in a forest to the internet. The network is made up of mycorrhizal fungi, which are thread-like strands that wrap around or grow into tree roots, connecting the root tips of different trees. This network, called a "mycorrhizal network", allows trees to share resources and communicate with each other:

- The fungi move nutrients like nitrogen, phosphorus and water from the soil to the trees.
- They can also transport substances from one tree to another.
- In exchange for nutrients, the trees share carbon-rich sugars made through photosynthesis with the fungi.

Some say the network allows trees to send chemical warnings of dangers like insect attacks.



This is a tree that got hit by lightning and it exposed its vascular system which carries water and minerals from the roots up to the leaves and photosynthesized food back down to the rest of the tree.

Trees have no muscles (or nervous wystem) so all of this movement is powered by turgor pressure, which is controlled by stomata in the leaves that open and close as needed.

Nature is so complex—and all created by God.

## And a story about a tree

"My teeth are too weak for apples", said the boy.

"My branches are gone", said the tree. "You cannot swing on them."

"I am too tired to climb", said the boy.

"I am sorry", sighed the tree. "I wish that I could give you something... but I have nothing left. I am an old stump. I am sorry..."

"I don't need very much now", said the boy, "just a quiet place to sit and rest. I am very tired".

"Well", said the tree, straightening herself up as much as she could, "Well, an old stump is good for sitting and resting. Come, Boy, sit down. Sit down and rest". And the boy did. And the tree was happy.
