From the Rectory

Take another look.....

The writer Kathleen Norris tells the story of an old man she knew who had been diagnosed with cancer. In his illness he had reached for a Bible which had been given to him and his wife on their Wedding Day by his Grandfather. The man confessed that he had never really bothered with it. It was leather-bound with the couple's names on the front cover. He and his new wife had sent a polite thank you note but simply placed it on a shelf in their wardrobe.

On opening the Bible, the now elderly and sick man discovered why his Grandfather had often asked them how much they'd liked their present. They thought he was showing signs of ageing, but these many years later it was revealed that Grandfather had placed a twenty-dollar Bill at the beginning of every Book of the Bible - over a thousand dollars in all. Because the man had just seen the Bible and assumed there was nothing there to interest him he (and his wife) had missed out on quite a gift.

We are used to hearing the word 'Prejudice' quite lot these days in a range of contexts. It literally describes our tendency to hold an 'opinion or feeling which has been formed beforehand or without knowledge, thought or reason'.

It also describes the way we sometimes appear to have become bored or tired with certain things or people. We often make somewhat lazy assumptions based on the label we can apply to someone ("I recognise your sort!") and that means we don't have to think or look more deeply. However, the risk we take is in missing out on quite a gift......

Perhaps with good reason we don't like to acknowledge how prone we can be to this kind of attitude but, if we're honest, I believe there are countless ways in which we make lazy and uninformed assumptions about people, things and places. Again, it's a kind of short-hand but in the end it's an unimaginative and bland way to live. It can be quite tragic when we see it, for example in a marriage, where a couple no longer think there is anything more to learn or discover about the other. So often it helps to take another look, to ask questions so that we don't miss out on quite a gift.....

There's an incident in John's Gospel (John 1.43-50) where Jesus was subject to this kind of prejudice. A man called Philip invites his friend Nathaniel to come and meet Jesus. Knowing where Jesus had come from, he immediately replied, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Mercifully, Nathaniel set aside his prejudiced view, accepted the invitation and his life was never the same again.

This Season of Lent is, it seems to me, a good opportunity to have a think about some of our prejudices; some of our automatic assumptions and reactions to things, people and places. In particular, I'd like to ask you to think about your assumptions (shall we call them prejudices?) about Jesus. How well do you really know him and all that he said and did? What might happen if you took another look?

This coming Lent, Holy Week and Easter is a good time for discovering what he is all about. In particular, Good Friday (where Christians spend a long time looking at the Cross and listening to the words of Jesus) is the perfect antidote for any sense that he is to be classed as ordinary or of no account.

The Gospels tell us of many people who are called 'passers-by' on the first Good Friday. They were people who made this mistake and saw nothing more of interest than the execution of another misbegotten criminal. But those who stayed by the cross; witnessed the way in which he died, looked more deeply; and listened to the things he said saw something more going on... and their lives were never the same again.

This Lent, Good Friday and Easter take another look... at Jesus. And don't miss out on the gift of a life-time.

THROUGH LENT Together in 2025

"Our only desire and our one choice should be this: I want and I choose

what better leads to the deepening of God's life in me"

St. Ignatius of Loyola, from the beginning of the Spiritual Exercises

The word LENT comes from an ancient word meaning 'Spring'. This season of the year is given to us as a springtime for our faith, an opportunity to consider prayerfully how we may become more open to the good work which God has begun within us. At the Ash Wednesday Service, we are given the following charge: "Brothers and sisters in Christ, since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting. By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word."

Letting this Lent be for God

What if this Lent we didn't approach the practices of prayer, giving and fasting with an eye to what we can do to transform ourselves, but rather with an eye to what God wants to do in order to transform us?

It's very easy to approach Lent as though it were a series of New Year's resolutions: to give up a particular bad habit or share more with the poor or be more faithful in prayer. But Lent is not about self-improvement. Lent is a time of conversion in which God is in the driving seat, not us.

After all, Lent is a preparation for the season of Easter, and in Easter we see that Jesus comes to save us, despite ourselves. Peter swears up and down that he will never betray Jesus but then he does. A thief on the cross ends up being the first to be in Heaven with Jesus - a most unexpected consolation. Women go to the empty tomb to mourn and end up being missioned by Jesus, resurrected. Jesus reconciles with Peter despite the betrayals, and then gives him a central place in Church leadership. Easter is full of the unpredictable. Easter is a lot of amazing, beautiful surprises with the Resurrection at its heart.

If this is true, then again, Lent is not a project of self-improvement. Rather, it's a time for allowing God to transform us and a time of intentional cooperation with God's graces, where God leads and we follow. Like a good dance partner, we can choose to follow or not but God is always in the lead.

What might this look like in practice? The answer will be individual for each one of us. Essentially, a Lent of following God's lead must be grounded in prayer. Our intention is to listen for the voice of God and let ourselves be surprised by what the call in Lent might be.

As we begin to think about how we might enter into the coming Lenten season, you may wish to consider the following which are available this year.

NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE

Archbishop's Epiphany Letter

The Archbishop of York, **Stephen Cottrell**, has written to all clergy, Readers and congregations in the Church of England.

"Dear Friends in Christ,

Mindful of the ongoing challenges facing the Church of England, I write to you, the clergy, lay



ministers and people of the Church of England on this Feast of the Epiphany, trusting that with God's guidance, we can look to the future with great hopefulness in Christ. The Magi came to the Christ child and their lives were re-directed. Please join me in praying for the renewal of our church as we come again to Christ to seek God's way for God's church."

The Acting Bishop of Carlisle, **Rob Saner-Haigh**, has also written to all churches this week calling on as many people as possible to come together across our Diocese in regular collective prayer. He is calling on people to set alarms for **12 noon each Monday** and to spend five minutes in prayer. Rather than offering a list of things to pray for, initially Bishop Rob asks that everyone prays that God would give us a heart for prayer and that God would strengthen us for service.

Independent Safeguarding Audit

The Diocese of Carlisle and Carlisle Cathedral have welcomed a team of independent safeguarding auditors to Cumbria this week.

In August 2023, INEQE Safeguarding Group was appointed by the Archbishops' Council to carry out independent external audits of Church of England Dioceses and cathedrals. The purpose of these audits is to make sure Dioceses, Cathedrals and palaces are doing all they can to create environments where everyone feels safe, valued and respected. This week the INEQE team met with Diocesan and Cathedral staff, a survivor of abuse, as well as focus groups including Parish Safeguarding Officers, churchwardens and clergy. Prior to the team's visit, 580 people also completed an online safeguarding survey, the results of which were fed directly to INEQE.

Bishop Rob said: "We have been very pleased to welcome the INEQE team to Cumbria this week and to work alongside them as they complete their independent audit of our safeguarding practices, protocols and procedures. "We very much look forward to receiving feedback and to draw on the associated learning and outcomes as we continue along our safeguarding journey - both individually and organisationally - and which remains a primary focus for us as we continue to look to make our churches safer places for all."

The Very Rev Jonathan Brewster, the Dean of Carlisle, added: "We are grateful to INEQE for a positive process, and we look forward to receiving their recommendations as we continue to learn, develop and sustain a safeguarding culture that enables people in all their diversity across the Cathedral and beyond to flourish."

An INEQE audit report of the Diocese of Carlisle and Carlisle Cathedral will be published in coming weeks and will be available on the INEQE, Diocesan and Cathedral websites.

SAFEGUARDING 'MASTERCLASS' TRAINING

The Diocese of Carlisle is to offer up a series of safeguarding 'masterclass' training sessions, which draw on requests for further support received over the last 18 months.

These will focus on specific areas which cannot be covered in sufficient detail in other training, due to time constraints. Topics to be explored include:

- Navigating the web
- Safeguarding adults
- Getting it right on safeguarding
- Mental health and faith

Whilst these are trialled, we are limiting spaces on each masterclass to 16 participants and, initially, are just opening invitations to Parish Safeguarding Officers and members of clergy. The hour-long sessions will be delivered on Zoom and are free to participants. They will be interactive sessions, and all materials will be made available after the sessions.

Members of the Crown Nominations Commission came together this week to shortlist candidates as they continue to further discern and nominate a new Bishop of Carlisle.

The group – which includes six representatives from the Diocese - met on Wednesday, 22nd January, with interviews for those shortlisted scheduled for 13th and 14th March.

Churches and congregations are being encouraged to continue to use the special Diocesan prayer (below) in regular intercessions as the appointment process continues.

REPAIRED AND RESTORED

Our Silver Chalices and Ciborium required some repairs after the Chalice presentation plates on their bases had become detached.

One Chalice is dated June 1864 and was donated by Eliza Horrocks, the widow of a cotton manufacturer who moved from Preston into Merlewood in 1858. She

died there in 1872 and is buried at Lindale. The other Chalice was donated by Mary and Anna Taylor on the 13th October 1853. I believe it was used for the very first Holy Communion in the newly built St Paul's Church. These two very precious items are now splendidly repaired.





Our Ciborium, which holds our

Communion hosts, has no inscription. Like many items in Church it was probably donated anonymously. Over time the lid had become ill-fitting and the cross on the top bent. Both these defects have also now been carefully repaired.

ON HER TRAVELS

You may like to read about one of the newer members of our congregation who is currently missing in our pews!

At the end of December, Helen Cooper flew to Kampala with her husband Rob, then onwards by road about 184 miles to western Uganda to a place called Kyaninga, six miles from Fort Portal, a largish city.

They are based at Kyaninga Child Development Centre (kyaningacdc.org). Helen is a retired occupational therapist, and they are working mainly with disabled children, many with cerebral palsy. Rob works at the mobility centre there making bamboo wheelchairs. Monday to Friday Helen goes out to rural areas some long distances away from where they are based on some challenging roads. A baboon once tried to jump through the car window! They set up camps; some children are quite malnourished and they are given food packs. She teaches the local therapists the importance of play. She takes toys which they try and pinch!

The mobility centre is below a rather smart lodge which overlooks a beautiful lake called Crater Lake which is safe

to swim in. Rob gets nice lunches at the lodge, while Helen when out in the rural areas eats a local dish called Matoke which is cooked banana, peanut sauce and goat. The temperature is very hot during the day and they have to sleep beneath mosquito nets. They both work very hard Monday to Friday and really look forward to relaxing at the weekends.
