From the Rectory

God's Invitation

The season of Lent begins with an invitation. In short, God's word to you and I is: "Come back to me, with all of your heart". But what of our response?

At our best we might want to say "Yes". But preoccupied as we are, often as not, the moment never seems quite right. Yes, of course we want to have a deeper relationship with God, we might tell ourselves earnestly. But in effect it seems that we are not ready for God to love us. Yes, we'll come. Soon. One day. "When I get my life sorted out" or "When I retire". However, God will have none of this. God calls to us again: "Come back to me, with all of your heart". In Lent, God invites me to let go of my defences and prevarications.

So, from the first day of Lent, the Ash Wednesday readings make God's call to us clear: "Come back to me, with all of your heart," and our prayer is, in the words of the Psalm, "Create in me a clean heart, O God,.... Give me back the joy of your salvation". The good news is that this is exactly what our loving God wants to give us, "the joy of salvation". The joy of knowing that we are truly his beloved son or daughter. No matter what we think of ourselves, the truth is that our God is insistent, loving and gently prodding. God is the parent of the Prodigal Child, waiting faithfully and eagerly on the road for our return. All we need to do is remember that there are no folded arms or stern, critical stare awaiting us: only the straining eyes of a parent eager for our return, longing to embrace us and rejoice in us.

Again, like the Prodigal Son (in Luke Chapter 15), whilst we spend so much time trying to think of how to return and what to say, how to begin the conversation, it's only when we finally appear after so much time away, embarrassed and confused, that we understand that we don't have to say anything. We only have to show up; look up there on the road ahead of us, at our loving God jumping up and down for joy because the invitation has been heard. We have returned home! God is smothering us with embraces and joyful cries.

So... again, what stops us from this great reunion? What keeps us from accepting this invitation to something deeper in our life with God? Perhaps, again, we feel in our hearts that there are things we should say first: "wait...but...if only" and, finally, "If God really knew about me..." But the response is always, that it doesn't matter. None of it matters. "Come back to me, with all of your heart," says God. All we have to do is say to our Lord, "I'm here. Where do I start? Yes, I want to be with you".

So, what's the next step on our journey home? We could take the earliest moments of our day, before we get out of bed, to thank God for such a loving invitation and ask for help in opening our hearts to it. We could remember throughout the day the invitation that has moved our hearts: "Come back to me, with all of your heart". That is the invitation of each day of Lent. Today is the day to accept it.

THROUGH LENT Together in 2025

"Our only desire and our one choice should be this: I want and I choose

what better leads to the deepening of God's life in me"

St. Ignatius of Loyola, from the beginning of the Spiritual Exercises

The word LENT comes from an ancient word meaning 'Spring'. This season of the year is given to us as a springtime for our faith, an opportunity to consider prayerfully how we may become more open to the good work which God has begun within us. At the Ash Wednesday Service, we are given the following charge: "Brothers and sisters in Christ, since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting. By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word."

Letting this Lent be for God

What if this Lent we didn't approach the practices of prayer, giving and fasting with an eye to what we can do to transform ourselves, but rather with an eye to what God wants to do in order to transform us?

It's very easy to approach Lent as though it were a series of New Year's resolutions: to give up a particular bad habit or share more with the poor or be more faithful in prayer. But Lent is not about self-improvement. Lent is a time of conversion in which God is in the driving seat, not us.

After all, Lent is a preparation for the season of Easter, and in Easter we see that Jesus comes to save us, despite ourselves. Peter swears up and down that he will never betray Jesus but then he does. A thief on the cross ends up being the first to be in Heaven with Jesus - a most unexpected consolation. Women go to the empty tomb to mourn and end up being missioned by Jesus, resurrected. Jesus reconciles with Peter despite the betrayals, and then gives him a central place in Church leadership. Easter is full of the unpredictable. Easter is a lot of amazing, beautiful surprises with the Resurrection at its heart.

If this is true, then again, Lent is not a project of self-improvement. Rather, it's a time for allowing God to transform us and a time of intentional cooperation with God's graces, where God leads and we follow. Like a good dance partner, we can choose to follow or not but God is always in the lead.

What might this look like in practice? The answer will be individual for each one of us. Essentially, a Lent of following God's lead must be grounded in prayer. Our intention is to listen for the voice of God and let ourselves be surprised by what the call in Lent might be.

As we begin to think about how we might enter into the coming Lenten season, you may wish to consider the following which are available this year.

CALL TO COLLECTIVE PRAYER FOR THE CROWN NOMINATIONS COMMISSION

The Dean of Carlisle, the Very Rev'd Jonathan Brewster, has written to all clergy encouraging people to come together in prayer on the days that candidates are interviewed to be the next Bishop of Carlisle.

The Crown Nominations Commission - which includes six Diocesan representatives - will be conducting interviews on **Thursday 13th** and **Friday 14th March**. Churches are asked to come together locally in prayer for the discernment process and three 'prayer hubs' have also been set up which people are encouraged to visit:

- **Carlisle Cathedral** Intercessions for the appointment process will be included at Evensong on both days.
- Kendal Parish Church Thursday 13 March from 7pm and Friday 14 March <u>from 2pm</u> (half an hour on both days).
- St Michael's Workington Thursday 13 March from 11am and Friday 14 March from 1pm (half an hour on both days).

The Archbishop of Canterbury is a key leader within the Church of England and the wider Anglican Communion, which is made up of churches in over 165 countries. He is also the Diocesan Bishop of Canterbury, supported by the Bishop of Dover.

The process to nominate the next Archbishop of Canterbury is underway, and we want to hear from you. Whether you are based in England or anywhere in the Anglican Communion, your views matter. This consultation invites you to share your thoughts on what qualities, values, and vision the future Archbishop should embody. This public consultation runs alongside consultation with key stakeholders from in and around the Church. The World Day of Prayer is an international ecumenical Christian laywomen's initiative. It is run under the motto "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action" and is celebrated annually in over 170 countries on the first Friday in March. This year's service is being hosted by St Paul's on Friday, 7th March, at 2 pm. All are welcome to join us.

On the first Friday in March the Day of Prayer begins on the international dateline, in Samoa. Early in the morning, Christian women begin praying for our world. As the earth rotates, a Atlantic, mericas, sun finally re the final orldwide mplete. Cook Islands 2025 back to rariet b great wave of prayer begins to build. It sweeps across the Pacific, touching Fiji and New Zealand, rolling on through Asia: Japan, the Philippines, Korea, and Bangladesh. The countries of Africa, and the Middle East are next. The wave reaches the shores of Europe as the day dawns there. Across the Atlantic, it moves onwards, the Caribbean, the Americas, and on to the Pacific again until the sun finally sets over American Samoa where the final service takes place. A worldwide circle of prayer is complete.



The WDP Logo The symbol for World Day of Prayer was developed by the women of Ireland and adopted as the international logo in 1982. Its design is made up of arrows converging from the four points of the compass, persons kneeling in prayer, the Celtic cross, and the circle, representing the world and our unity through all our diversity.

The theme for 2026 is 'I will give you rest: come', and is being written by the women of Nigeria.

The origins of WDP date back to the 19th century when Christian women of the US and Canada initiated a variety of activities to support women's involvement in mission at home and in other parts of the world. Women had a strong sense of identification with the needs of women and children and sought ways to provide appropriate support. After the devastation of World War I, women were convinced that world peace was intrinsically tied to world mission, and renewed their efforts for unity. In the second half of 1926 the women of North America distributed the worship service to many countries and partners in mission. The response worldwide was enthusiastic and the *World Day of Prayer* came into being.

Ever since, women have gathered for a service written each year by the women of a different country. Today's service comes from a group of ecumenical Christian women in the Cook Islands in the Pacific Ocean, with the theme 'I Made You Wonderful', based on Psalm 139. Each of us is made with care and loved by God. We also learn how to treat every other person as made wonderful by God. The Worship Service invites us to notice aspects of our divinely created bodies that we often take for granted. The reading from Psalm 139,1-18 is woven together with stories of three women from the Cook Islands. We come to understand that God knows us, is always with us, and made us unique and special.

"THROUGHOUT ALL AGES, WORLD WITHOUT END"

An extract from '*The shape of the* Liturgy' by **Dom Gregory Dix** (1901-1952)

HIS WORDS ON THE HOLY EUCHARIST



Was ever another command so obeyed? For century after century, spreading slowly to every continent and country and among every race on earth, this action has been done, in every conceivable human circumstance, for every conceivable human need from infancy and before it to extreme old age and after it, from the pinnacle of earthly greatness to the refuge of fugitives in the caves and dens of the earth. Men have found no better thing than this to do for kings at their crowning and for criminals going to the scaffold; for armies in triumph or for a bride and bridegroom in a little country church; for the proclamation of a dogma or for a good crop of wheat; for the wisdom of the Parliament of a mighty nation or for a sick old woman afraid to die; for a schoolboy sitting an examination or for Columbus setting out to discover America; for the famine of whole provinces or for the soul of a dead lover; in thankfulness because my father did not die of pneumonia; for the repentance of Margaret; for the settlement of a strike; for a son for a barren woman; for Captain so-and-so wounded and prisoner of war; while the lions roared in the nearby amphitheatre; on the beach at Dunkirk; while the hiss of scythes in the thick June grass came faintly through the windows of the church; tremulously, by an old monk on the 50th anniversary of his vows; furtively, by an exiled bishop who had hewn timber all day in a prison camp near Murmansk; gorgeously, for the canonisation of St Joan of Arc-one could fill many pages with the reasons why men have done this, and not tell a hundredth part of them. And best of all, week by week and month by month, on a 100,000 successive Sundays, faithfully, unfailingly, across all the parishes of Christendom, the pastors have done this just to make the plebs sancta Dei-the holy common people of God.

To those who know a little of Christian history probably the most moving of all the reflections it brings is not the thought of the great events and the well-remembered saints, but of those innumerable millions of entirely obscure faithful men and women, every one with his or her own individual hopes and fears and joys and sorrows and loves - and sins and temptations and prayers. They have left no slightest trace in this world, not even a name, but have passed to God utterly forgotten by men. Yet each of them once believed and prayed as I believe and pray, and found it hard and grew slack and sinned and repented and fell again. Each of them worshipped at the Eucharist, and found their thoughts wandering and tried again, and felt heavy and unresponsive and yet knew - just as really and pathetically as I do these things. There is a little ill-spelled ill-carved rustic epitaph of the 4th century from Asia Minor: 'Here sleeps the blessed



Chione, who has found Jerusalem for she prayed much'. Not another word is known of Chione, some peasant woman who lived in that vanished world of Christian Anatolia. But how lovely if all that should survive after 16 centuries were that one had prayed much, so that the neighbours who saw all one's life were sure one must have found Jerusalem! What did the Sunday Eucharist in her village church every week for a lifetime mean to the blessed Chione - and to the millions like her then, and every year since? The sheer stupendous quantity of the love of God which this ever-repeated action has drawn

from the obscure Christian multitudes through the centuries is in itself an overwhelming thought.

It is because it became embedded deep down in the life of the Christian peoples, colouring all the via vitae of the ordinary man and woman, marking its personal turning-points, marriage, sickness, death and the rest, running through it year by year with the feasts and fasts and the rhythm of the Sundays, that the eucharistic action became inextricably woven into the public history of the Western world. The thought of it is inseparable from its great turning-points also. Pope Leo doing this in the morning before he went out to daunt Attila, on the day that saw the continuity of Europe saved; and another Leo doing this three and a half centuries later when he crowned Charlemagne Roman Emperor, on the day that saw that continuity fulfilled. Or again Alfred wandering defeated by the Danes staying his soul on this, while mediaeval England struggled to be born; and Charles I also, on that morning of his execution when mediaeval England came to its final end. Such things strike the mind with their suggestions of a certain timelessness about the eucharistic action and an independence of its setting. At Constantinople they 'do this' yet with the identical words and gestures that they used while the silver trumpets of the Basileus still called across the Bosphorus, in what seems to us now the strange fairy-tale land of the Byzantine empire. In this 20th century Charles de Foucauld in his hermitage in the Sahara 'did this' with the same rite as Cuthbert 12 centuries before in his hermitage on Lindisfarne. This very morning I did this with a set of texts which has not changed by more than a few syllables since Augustine used those very words at Canterbury on the third Sunday of Easter in the summer after he landed. Yet 'this' can still take hold of a man's life and work with it.

George Eglinton Alston Dix OSB, known as Gregory Dix, was a British monk and priest of Nashdom Abbey, an Anglican Benedictine community. He was a noted liturgical scholar whose work had particular influence on the reform of Anglican liturgy in the mid-20th century. He is remembered in the Church of England with a commemoration on 12th May.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTRE AND KYANINGA MOBILITY, UGANDA

The Kyaninga Child Development Centre (KCDC), a pioneering force in children's rehabilitation and inclusive education, was founded in 2014 by Steve and Asha Williams, together with physiotherapist Fiona Bekerlagge. KCDC advocates for and supports children with disabilities in Uganda, and over the past 10 years its innovative programmes and services have directly impacted 8,000 children and their families. KCDC works closely with families,



communities and local partners to ensure sustainable, long-term impact. From providing essential therapy services to championing inclusive education and manufacturing locally-made assistive devices, KCDC has been a beacon of hope for families in need, improving the quality of life.

Steve Williams' dedication stems from his personal journey with his disabled son, Sidney. His passion for improving the lives of children with disabilities has earned him the MBE distinction which he received from the King last month, a testament to his tireless efforts to create an inclusive culture in Uganda. Steve said "I am deeply honoured to receive this recognition, but the true heroes are the children, families and team members of KCDC who inspire me every day".

Rob and Helen travelled in Africa 33 years ago, and on their return home Helen worked as a children's Occupational Therapist for the NHS. It has always been her dream that upon retirement she would share her skills and knowledge back in Africa and, after a lot of networking, they found KCDC. Their involvement has exceeded expectations, with both Helen and her husband Rob being able to utilise their skills.



Working with a team of physio-therapists, OTs, speech therapists, nutritionists and social workers, Helen has created a special connection to work learning from one other, and attending outreaches to rural areas to support families and empower them to help their children have a better quality of life. She has loved developing therapy equipment out of local resources, eg using a water jerry can filled with local soil to help sitting, kneeling, standing, and teaching the importance of play, again using everyday objects. The work is very tiring, but exciting to see more of the area and a privilege to be invited into local Rob has been working at Kyaninga Mobility, using his experience in practical problem solving, contributing to continuing manufacturing improvements through design refinements, improving production efficiencies with modified jig designs and techniques, teaching more skilled use of the machine tools, and making bench tools using locally available resources. Probably the most valuable contribution was to simply look at the same old problems with fresh eyes and fresh ideas.

A major success was to pick up the continuing design, build and commissioning of a wheelchair drop test machine, so that the chairs no longer



require shipping to the USA for testing, to demonstrate compliance with international standards. This is going to be a huge saving for the charity. The wheelchairs themselves are a work of art; the workforce take great pride in their work and are an absolute pleasure to work with. The reward is priceless as the children light up with excitement having a new-found freedom in their individually specialised wheelchairs.

The whole experience has been such hard work, yet so very humbling, and Helen and Rob intend to return again next year. Should you be inspired to support KCDC, Helen and Rob aim to raise funds to 'buy a wheelchair' on their return to Grange.

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
